The Cook Islands are in the South Pacific Oceania, northeast of New Zealand, between French Polynesia and American Samoa. The largest island of its 15 islands, Rarotonga, is home to rugged mountains and Avarua, the national capital.

Cook Islanders are citizens of New Zealand but also have the status of Cook Island nationals. The Cook Islands' main business centres are on Rarotonga, an island just 32 kilometres in circumference that you can drive around in 45 minutes. Rarotonga has an estimated population of 9,000 and hosts an international airport.

English is the official language although the locals also speak Cook Islands Maori.

The Cook Islands Squash Racquets Association was incorporated on 17th November 1992.

The Cook Islands Open is held annually attracting players from New Zealand, Australia and the Oceania Region. The event is normally held in October of each year and is a great chance for holidaymakers to mix with the locals in what is usually a very competitive tournament.
