

In 1994 the first Oceania Junior Championships was held in Mackay, Queensland, with the 2nd Championships being held in Wellington, New Zealand in 1996.

There was a huge break between Championships and the next event was not held for many years. The Oceania Squash Federation is currently researching records and will update as information comes to hand.

In 2012 the event was resurrected with the Oceania Junior Championships being hosted by Squash Victoria in the Melbourne Sports & Aquatic Centre (MSAC). This event was played in conjunction with the Victoria Junior State Titles with competitions in 11, 13, 15, 17 and 19 age groups for both Boys and Girls. The event was registered on the World Junior Circuit for the first time, allowing 19 year age group players to accumulate world ranking points.

At the 2013 Annual General Meeting the Members agreed that the event should be held annually with Australia and New Zealand hosting the event on alternate years.

The 2014 event was held at Palm Beach on the Gold Coast attracting a total of 148 players. Although numbers have varied it has become a popular event and attracting more players each year.

It has been held annually since 2015 with the exception of the 2020 and 2021 which were cancelled due to the world-wide Covid pandemic which restricted both court usage and travel.

The Oceania Junior Championships is an open event so junior players from around the world can enter if they so wish, however the emphasis is on securing players from the Oceania Region. To be eligible players must have a valid WSF SPIN registration and provide proof-of-age to the Championship Director at Tournament Control on arrival.
