

DOUBLES RULES NEWSLETTER - March 2014

This is a summary to help the teams who will be at the 2014 Commonwealth Games in Glasgow, Scotland. I will be in Glasgow as a WSF Assessor and I will have time to help you, so please come and find me

COURT WIDTH

• 8.42 metres which is just over 2 metres wider than a standard Singles court

TIN HEIGHT

• 13" (33cms) which is 10cms lower than a standard Singles court

EYE GUARDS

• Must be worn properly over the eyes at all times during play, including during the warm-up

CLOTHING

- Partners must wear the same colour shirt and preferably the same colour shorts/skirts
- The colour must be different from the opponents' shirts
- If both teams are wearing similar colours, the higher placed team in the draw has the colour choice
- If players change shirts during a match they must change to the same colour shirts they were originally wearing

SCORING

- Best of 3 games
- Point-A-Rally to 11 points (no 2-point advantage at 10-all)

TIME BETWEEN GAMES

2 minutes

SERVICE

- Serving order alternates between teams as A1, B1, A2, B2
- Serving order must remain the same throughout a match
- When the serve changes from one team to the other, the serving team can serve from either service box

RECEIVING SERVE

- Partners must receive from the same side of the court throughout each game, but ...

 Can change receiving sides at the start of each game but must notify opponents and officials
- Players can stand anywhere for receiving service, providing there is no interference to server or receiver
- If receiver swings and misses, partner cannot return service

INTERFERENCE

- If A1 swings at the ball and misses, the partner A2 can hit the ball (except for return of serve)
- Only the player who encounters interference can appeal (unless both partners are attempting to play the ball)
- If both partners appeal, the decision giving the greater reward to the striking team stands, e.g. stroke is greater than let, and let is greater than no let

Whether a striker hits an opponent with the ball or refrains from hitting the ball:

Stroke if:

- The outgoing opponent has played the ball back close to the body and then does not make a
 reasonable effort to avoid interference particularly for direct access to the ball and preventing a
 reasonable swing; or
- The outgoing opponent's ball has gone close to the partner's body and the **partner** does not make any effort to avoid interference.

No Let if:

• Interference is caused only by the striker's partner

CONDUCT PENALTY

• Must be given against the striker's team if the referee decides a striker's action is dangerous.

TURNING

There is no Stroke provision. Let is allowed:

- If fear of hitting an opponent, and
- If would have been a good return

FURTHER ATTEMPT

• If, after the striker swings and misses, the ball then touches an opponent: Let is allowed if either player from the striking team could make a good return

FALLEN OBJECT

- If any object falls to the floor, play must stop
- Player's rackets are classed as "objects"
- Eye guards will be treated as "fallen" if they move from over the eyes

BLEEDING

• A player is allowed 30 minutes to attend to a bleeding wound

ILLNESS

• If a player vomits on court, the opposing team wins the match
